Welcome

Hello, and welcome to Fringe of Colour Films 2023! Thank you for joining us for the festival's third edition, featuring a programme of 22 films by Black, Asian, Indigenous and Latine people in Scotland and around the world, and over 15 different online and in-person events.

Our belief is that one of our greatest offerings is our malleability to the needs and wants of our artists, audiences and communities. 2022 gave us the time and space to think about what they could use in this uncertain but inspiration-filled climate and what we, as a team, could deliver.

This means we are continuing to build on the work we have already started, but this year brings one major, and exciting change for Fringe of Colour Films. For the first time, we are taking a hybrid approach, operating both online on our website – just like in previous years – and in-person at Edinburgh's Summerhall.

We could not be more excited to make our home at Summerhall for the first time. Sharing in these experiences of film screenings, discussions and even a communal meal will bring us together in a way that we have so far not been able to do. That being said, the return of in-person events should not come at the cost of progress. Online events remain important to us and numerous communities for a host of different issues, many of which existed long before the COVID-19 pandemic. We are immensely proud of our online festival, and so we have continued to develop it while thinking about how to create a hybrid programme that is truly integrated for all our audiences. This year, we aim to continue thinking about how best to connect the artists we work with to new and responsive audiences. We will continue to form links with online audiences throughout Scotland and around the world. In this way, we hope to reach beyond the confines of borders or costly travel, and we hope our audiences enjoy engaging with the festival in this limitless and expansive way.

Our programme features a wide range of filmic experiences, including deeply personal stories, new commissions and global premieres, connecting us closely to the world we are living in. Both inherently political and fuelled by enjoyment, our programme tackles some of the most important global social issues we are currently facing while acknowledging that there must be art and beauty on the journey to freedom from inequality and oppression.

We have continued our tradition of commissioning new work with Black, queer, Scotland-based artists, this year working with Ashanti Harris, who will close the Festival programme with her new film *Black Gold*.

We maintain that understanding and appreciation is at the core of our programme, enriched through our Responses project, our Audio Programme *Before the Applause*, and with filmmaker Q&As, discussions and events.

We want to loudly make ourselves known to cinephiles who rely on access tools such as audio descriptions, captions, and British Sign Language, to make it clear that our programme will always include these communities. Our entire programme is equipped with these tools.

The time has finally come, and we are all immensely excited to be bringing our festival back as we look forward to another summer of art, ideas and collaboration. Whether you'll be joining us Online or In-Person, we hope you enjoy the beautiful opportunity these films and events have to offer to your wider connection to art and our natural world.

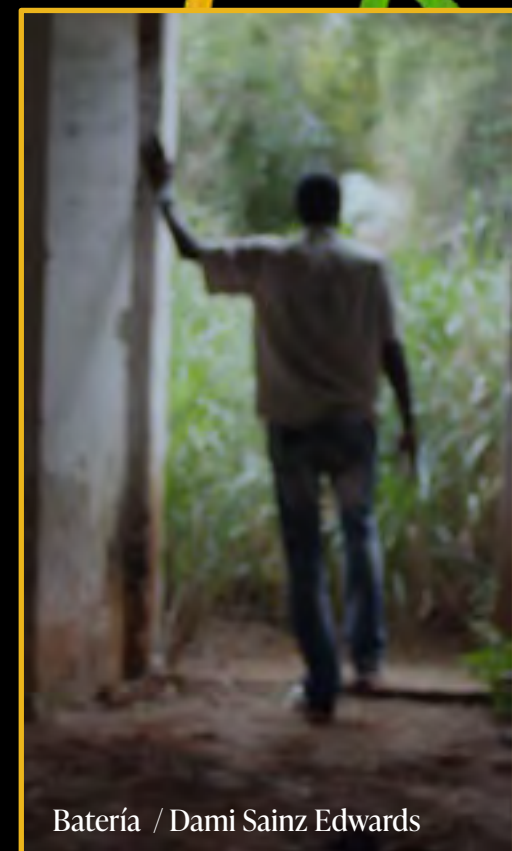

About Eringe of Colour

Fringe of Colour is a multi-award-winning initiative dedicated to supporting Black people and People of Colour at arts festivals in Scotland and beyond. It began in 2018 as a publicly-available database of shows by Black people and People of Colour at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. [The Fringe of Colour database](#) promotes these performances while simultaneously highlighting the scarcity of these shows and the disproportionate promotion and support they receive in comparison to productions by white performers. In 2019, Fringe of Colour facilitated a free ticket scheme, providing People of Colour with tickets to attend shows by Performers of Colour at the Edinburgh Fringe and beyond.

2020 posed new challenges. In the midst of COVID-19, with festivals and live events cancelled and a necessary move towards the virtual, we noticed that many organisations gladly fell back on the “safe”; read: white, straight, cis, able-bodied, neurotypical, wealthy or middle class, for online content. In creating our own festival, Fringe of Colour Films, we are unconstrained by the parameters set by other Scottish arts festivals. Our very own hybrid arts festival gives us the freedom to look for people from our many different communities to support, acknowledge and work with in a way that centres the essential relationship between the artists and their audiences.

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All the Info

Passes

We have three ticket options available. An **Online Pass** starts at £5 and provides access to the full online festival. An **In-Person Pass** provides access to both the online and in-person festival, starting at £18. Passes can only be purchased online on the **[Passes and Tickets page of our website.](#)**

Pass Holders have access to the entirety of the festival programme and should not incur any extra costs, but please note that for some events you may need to book in advance.

Single In-Person tickets will be available on the door for each event, with a suggested contribution of £4. Please note that these may not be available for events where capacity has already been reached.

Online Screenings

Access to the Online programme will be granted on Friday 23 June at 12pm BST. To watch films and listen to recorded events on the website, you must log in to your account using the email address and password you used when purchasing your Pass. Once signed in, all content will be made available to you, according to the festival schedule.

Every film in the programme will have three different versions, which can be navigated to using the access tool buttons on each Film Page:

A version with only soft Closed Captions (CC) (meaning captions you can turn on or off)

A version with Audio Descriptions + CC

A version with British Sign Language interpretations + CC

Every film in the programme will screen in-person with either British Sign Language interpretation and Closed Captions (BSL/CC) or Audio Description (AD). These screenings will happen simultaneously in two different spaces within the Summerhall venue, so please ensure you navigate to the appropriate space listed in the programme.

For screenings with complementary live events – for example post-screening Q&As and discussions – in-person audiences will reconvene together in a central space. These spaces are listed in the programme under their respective events. Members of the Fringe of Colour Films team will be on hand to guide you from your screening to the appropriate space.

All events are free for In-Person Pass Holders. Unless otherwise stated, it is not necessary to book. Simply show your pass at the door.

Programme

This year, our festival is thematically centred around the life cycle of a plant. Our programme speaks to the various stages of this process, from the **seeds** that we plant in the **soil**, to the process of **roots** finding their way into the earth and the importance of **nourishing** a growing plant. A plant's life cycle holds innumerable parallels with our own existence on this planet. Through thinking about this cycle, we also explore the **symbiotic** relationship we humans have with the greenery around us, the **fruits** that plants may yield, and the **pollination** that follows.



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FRUITS

The bearing of fruit is often the most celebrated stage in a plant's life-cycle. But fruits cannot be without each and every one of the other stages. The fruits of our festival are a series of events which have grown out of the themes and ideas expressed in our Soil, Seeds, Rooted, Nourish, Symbiosis and Pollination strands. There is at least one Fruits event every day of the festival, offering an opportunity to come together and a reminder that without planting and nurturing there are no fruits, and without you, there is no festival.

For the first time, Fringe of Colour Films has invited a guest curator to programme a special event as part of the festival. Our 2023 commissioned curator is Neha Apsara, a film programmer based in Glasgow, focusing on programming stories full of joy, drama and hidden histories centred around the queer and diasporic South Asian experience.

This curated programme, Begana, features two films from the Queer South Asian and Indo-Caribbean archive, which explore themes and conversations that were far ahead of their time. The first, a portrait of Indian lesbian poet and writer, Suniti Bamjoshi, and the second, a pivotal, pioneering work about the female, lesbian Indo-Caribbean perspective in exile by filmmaker Michelle Mohabeer.
